Mount Carmel College

Year 7 On The Move



Excitement is building as we get closer to 2019 when students in Catholic schools will study Year 7 in a secondary school. Lots of planning and preparation have already occurred. Many Year 4 and 5 parents have attended information sessions about how primary schools and secondary schools are preparing for the change. In the Catholic North Western Community, staff from the primary schools and Mount Carmel College meet regularly to share ideas and plan the preparation of students for the change. Special arrangements will be made in 2018 so that Year 6 and Year 7 students are all senior students in their primary school and they will have opportunities for leadership, special events and graduation rites of passage. In some cases the ceremonies and celebrations will be celebrated with both year levels together and for other occasions there might be separate year level events.

In secondary school, new buildings and complete upgrades of buildings are occurring to accommodate the influx of Year 7 students. Year 7 students will have access to all of the secondary school specialist facilities such as Science Labs, Technology Centres, STEM (Science, Technology, Engineering and Mathematics) Labs, Visual and Performing Arts, Music Centres, Sport and PE facilities. The Australian Curriculum is followed by all primary and secondary schools, so Year 7 in secondary school will be a smooth transition from Year 6 in terms of familiarity with the skills and content as well as homework expectations.

This is an exciting time as Catholic schools in South Australia fall into line with every other state of Australia to provide specialist teachers and facilities for Year 7 students in a secondary setting.


Mount Carmel College

Mount Carmel College - STEM Projects

This year Mount Carmel College has entered the STEMIE17 challenge. STEMIE17 stands for Science Technology Engineering Maths Innovation Experience 2017. This is an invitation only program in which a number of schools from around the state engage in a range of activities based on a theme.

This year the students are working on 4 projects associated with setting up a fictitious town in country South Australia – the town to be named Delores. The town will be linked by a high-speed rail line not only to Adelaide but also to Melbourne and Sydney. The train will travel up to 500 km/h which will make access to the new city quick and easy. We have been involved in similar challenges over the past few years, however this is the first time we have been able to embed the tasks into a range of Year 10 and 11 subjects. There are over 40 students who are involved in these projects. Six of our students will be chosen to represent Mount Carmel College at a Regional Showcase in late October. The school that comes out on top within our region will then move on to the State Final in November.

Walk a Mile in my Boots

Our Lady Queen of Peace students joyfully participated in a walk-a-thon initiative for Homelessness Awareness. Donations were collected for the Hutt Street Homeless Centre. Students were involved in learning more about the plight of homeless people in Adelaide and how small donations can make a huge difference to those struggling with day to day living. The students' goal was to raise enough money to provide 200 meals. This was easily achieved by the generosity of our school community, which enabled further support in providing shower and laundry service for three families for a month, and providing 36 hot lunches which was 'shouted' by Our Lady Queen of Peace staff.

Our Lady of Mt Carmel Parish School

We are located in the north western suburbs of Adelaide. We have a proud history as a co-educational primary school, beginning in Pennington in 1909.

We are committed to connecting with all our families and making a difference to the lives of those in our community. We achieve these goals informed by our Josephite tradition/support, the Carmelite priests who were part of our parish, and many past families and staff.

Our school has a strong focus on the development of skills and knowledge that will enable students to engage with their world and support life-long learning.

Student wellbeing is supported by a range of programs under the broad umbrella of KidsMatter.

Student's academic development is assisted by a strong emphasis on literacy and numeracy. Individual student priorities are identified through reflection on a range of student data and are responded to using a diversity of research-informed practices.

St Margaret Mary's School

St Margaret Mary's School has always been committed to finding ways to live out the Jospehite motto of the school, 'In all things Charity'. This has taken the form of a strong social outreach program, supported across the school and by the school community, who are always prepared to give in different ways to those less fortunate.

This winter, classes across the whole school supported the work of the Moore Street Centre in providing soup for those who are in need in Adelaide. Each student form the classes involved brought in a vegetable to use for the soup, which they then prepared and cooked with the help of their teachers and many generous parent volunteers.

It was wonderful to hear the conversations children had after they had learned about the work of Moore Street Help Centre and how they were supporting this work in a real and practical way,

"If people don't eat they get weak...we made soup to help," said pre-school student Prayag.

"Some people don't have heating or warm food so we can bring them soup to help," added Mac, a Year 5 student.

This has been a very simple, yet extremely successful initiative in the school community that has seen over 140 litres of soup made and delivered to Moore Street Centre.







Our Lady of the Visitation School

Our Lady of The Visitation School is a Preschool to Year 7 Catholic primary school, situated on the Le Fevre Peninsula. We offer a pathway from Preschool to year 7 that enables all students to develop in a creative, dynamic and progressive environment where learning prepares children for the world of today.

Literacy and numeracy, as well as student wellbeing are a strong focus at Our Lady of The Visitation. We teach and nurture all students in how to be responsible for their learning, actions and relationships. We are committed to working in partnership with parents, families and the community. At Our Lady of The Visitation, we offer a diverse range of extra-curricular learning activities as well as our specialist programs that include music, Italian, physical education and specialist sports.

St Patricks School

St Patrick's is a coeducational Catholic primary school for students from Reception to Year 7 in the Josephite tradition and is part of the Croydon Park Parish. St Patrick's School is a multicultural school with around 220 students. It has a strong literacy, numeracy and ICT focus, with teachers undertaking professional learning in these areas.

Students have the opportunity to have weekly specialist lessons in music/drama, physical education and also can choose to study Italian of Vietnamese.

St Patricks has two playgroup sessions on Wednesdays and Fridays from 9.30-11.30am. Students can also choose to be part of after school sport, instrumental music lessons and choir.

We have a Special Education Unit that enables students to learn in a special class as well as the mainstream class.

St Patrick's offers both before and after school care.

St Joseph's School

A three-day leadership program called the Journey to Emmaus is facilitated for Year 7 students from St Patrick's and St Joseph's Ottoway and draws inspiration from a Gospel Story (Luke 24:13-35). A similar program is also conducted at St Margaret Mary's and Whitefriars.

The program provides opportunities for the students to develop their understanding of leadership and how they can use their knowledge and creative energy to provide service in the school and wider community. Guest speakers Jayne Short from Vinnies and Fr Marek from Ottoway Parish, have spoken about what inspires them to help others. The students have visited the Vinnie's shelter in Whitmore Square and heard Tony Roach talk to them about what services are in the city to help people in great need.

The students have been motivated to fund raise and to collect goods and next term we will conclude the program with day of action. This will include cooking muffins and soups which will be delivered to the shelters. Other actions have included a baby clothes drive for the children in a South American orphanage supported by Fr Marek and a Mission's Day to collect funds for various Catholic Charities. Another highlight of this program was a tour of the St Francis Xavier's Cathedral which included a wonderful demonstration on the pipe organ.
