Dear Families

Be Brave. Make Change

"Be Brave. Make Change." was the theme of this year's Reconciliation Week. The dates for National Reconciliation Week remain the same each year; 27 May to 3 June. These dates commemorate two significant milestones in the reconciliation journey — the successful 1967 referendum, and the High Court Mabo decision respectively. Australia's most successful referendum saw more than 90 per cent of Australians vote to give the Australian Government power to make laws for Aboriginal and Torres Strait Islander people and recognise them in the Census.

On 3 June 1992 the Australian High Court delivered the Mabo decision, the culmination of Eddie Koiki Mabo's challenge to the legal fiction of 'terra nullius' (land belonging to no one) and leading to the legal recognition of Aboriginal and Torres Strait Islander

peoples as the Traditional Owners and Custodians of lands. This decision paved the way for Native Title.

Reconciliation must live in the hearts, minds and actions of all Australians as we move forward, creating a nation strengthened by respectful relationships between the wider Australian community, and Aboriginal and Torres Strait Islander peoples. We all have a role to play when it comes to reconciliation, and in playing our part we collectively build relationships and communities that value Aboriginal and Torres Strait Islander peoples, histories, cultures, and futures.

At Mount Carmel College the primary students celebrated a beautiful liturgy last Wednesday. The secondary students were involved as they learnt about our shared histories, cultures, and achievements, and explore how each of us can contribute to achieving reconciliation in Australia.

Aunty Josie Agius (1934-2015) was a Narungga, Kaurna, Ngarrindjeri and Ngadjuri leader and among South Australia's first Aboriginal health workers. A pillar of strength in the Aboriginal community, she was committed to sharing cultural knowledge with non-Aboriginal people. Aunty Josie worked extensively within Catholic schools, both secondary and primary schools, sharing her cultural knowledge and providing support to many Aboriginal cultural instructors working in Catholic schools. In 2014 she was awarded the Premier's NAIDOC Award in response to her tireless advocacy for, and championing of, reconciliation.

Train Crossing Safety

A few weeks ago there was a very sad tragedy at the Alberton Train Station involving a member of the public. It is a timely reminder to our community about the importance of safety at these crossings. Rules and procedures are put in place for a reason and there are a number of warning signs and symbols that need to be obeyed. Failure to do so can result in tragedy and we don't want to see anyone get hurt. We would ask parents to have a conversation with their children about the following: Never ignore signals, and always use caution. Before you begin to cross, **wait for gates to fully rise and for all lights to stop flashing.** Never assume that there is only one train coming from a single direction.

Winter Uniform

Now that the days are getting colder it is important that our students don't move away from our uniform expectations. There is scope within our uniform guidelines for students to wear layers as outlined in the Uniform Schedule. Students are not permitted to wear items of clothing that fall outside of our approved uniform items. If students need extra uniform items during the winter months they will need to access them through Hambours Uniform Shop at Royal Park. I have attached below an extract from our Uniform Policy and Procedures document that outlines the rationale that underpins our uniform requirements:

- At Mount Carmel College, students wear a compulsory student uniform with a sense of pride in belonging to the school community. The student uniform promotes equity and equality, self-discipline and care. While at school and in the community, students represent the legacy, tradition, and values of the College by proudly wearing the student uniform with the motto Caritas et Dignitas (Love and Dignity), reflecting the high standard of behaviour required of a Mount Carmel College student.
- Health and safety factors are important when incorporating items of clothing as part of the student uniform. Specific instructions for wearing the uniform may apply when undertaking certain tasks or in particular locations.

Each year, the Primary Campus acknowledges and focuses their learning on Reconciliation Week

and the importance of this to both Aboriginal and Torres Strait Islander Peoples and Non-Indigenous people. We have grounded our learning based on 'truth' and the students learning reflects this. Across our Primary Campus, each unit has had a particular focus exploring the important milestones of this week.

The students in the MacKillop Unit, have been learning about what the word 'Reconciliation' means, what it looks like and the importance of this when speaking about past hurts caused to our First Nations Peoples. They have been involved in many other activities such as learning some phrases in Kaurna, exploring art and continuing to develop the understanding of the importance of Acknowledgement to Country.

In the Tenison Unit, students have been learning about the timeline for Reconciliation with a particular focus on the 1967 Referendum which saw more than 90 per cent of Australians vote to give the Australian Government power to make laws for Aboriginal and Torres Strait Islander people and recognise them in the Census. They have also been learning about the Stolen Generation and the impact of this on the Indigenous Community making a beautiful display in their classroom of Purple Hibiscus Flowers in memory of the Aboriginal and Torres Strait Islander children who were taken away from their families.

In the Josephite Learning Centre, the students delved deeper into the National Apology to the Stolen Generation developing their understanding of the importance of this speech for all Australians. The students have also been learning more about land rights and the pioneering man who fought for this 'Eddie Mabo' on the 30th anniversary of the High Court ruling. This legal recognition of Aboriginal and Torres Strait Islander peoples being the Traditional Owners and Custodians of lands. has paved the way for Native Title.

On Wednesday, we also gathered as a whole campus with the Year 5 students leading a reflective and powerful National Reconciliation Week Liturgy. The Reception students contributed to this liturgy by making candle holders. We were also very honoured to have our Aboriginal and Torres Strait Islanders families join us.

Recently the South Australia Metropolitan Service (MFS) have presented the Road Awareness Program (RAP) to Year 11 students as a part of the school's Pastoral Care Program. The RAP Program's main aim is keeping students safe on the roads, by using an honest and straight forward commonsense message. More specifically the presenter spoke with students about:

- good attitudes, smart decision making and safe behaviours
- the dangers of excessive speeds, distractions and driving under the influence
- being a responsible passenger and pedestrian
- becoming a responsible driver
- first-hand experience of the trauma suffered by all parties involved in both fatal and nonfatal road crashes

A central element of this program was a talk by a real-life road crash

survivor who implored students to learn from the accidents that happen on the road. Having been injured on the road the guest speaker, told his story of him driving and the car in front lost their load causing him to have a road accident, and changing his life forever. Some students also took part in a recreated scenario where they had been directly involved in a road crash. This gave students the opportunity to explore the emotional impact of their actions and confront how the aftermath would affect their life plans. At the end of the presentation students completed a survey, from the responses:

- 32% nominated that they were RESPONSIBLE as road users prior to seeing RAP.
- 68% nominated that they were RISK TAKERS as road users prior to seeing RAP.
- 0% nominated that they were TOTALLY IRRESPONSIBLE prior to seeing RAP.

 ALL participants checked the box indicating they choose to be a RESPONSIBLE road user after participating in the RAP presentation.

Student written feedback:

"I think the presentation made me realise how bad our current road safety issue is and how much better it can actually be. It starts with us to make the change."

"This program is really helpful to open younger people's eyes up to the reality of risky driving."

"Thank you for doing this, I lost my Uncle to a car crash and this provides young people with information about the severity of their actions and how to be safe."

CPC20220 – Certificate II Construction Pathways – FIP 2022 12 month program offered on Thursdays commencing in Term 3

This Certificate II in Construction Pathways is a Flexible Industry Pathway (FIP) and is partially funded by the Department of Innovation and Skills (Subsidised Training List). The course develops building and construction skills, to introduce students to the specialised construction fields of work, including carpentry, brick and block laying, wall and ceiling fixing and tiling. This course is endorsed and supported by the Construction Industry Training Board (CITB) and provides some support for eligible students under the Doorways2Construction program.

MEM20413 – Certificate II Engineering Pathways – FIP 2022 12 month program offered on Thursdays commencing in Term 3

This Certificate II in Engineering Pathways is a Flexible Industry Pathway (FIP) and is partially funded by the Department of Innovation and Skills (Subsidised Training List). This course has been designed to develop skills in fabrication and machining, to introduce students to the specialised engineering fields of work, including fabrication, machining, sheet metal and manufacturing processes. It is a qualification that allows students to explore future options within the diverse engineering and manufacturing sector.

Limited numbers will apply on these courses and the amount of interest will determine if the courses proceed.

The closing date for the expressions of interest has been extended to Friday 17 June.
