Welcome to the first edition of Future Families for 2023, one of our communications to keep in touch with you as a future student and family of the College.

Fantastic Year 12 SACE Results for 2022 On behalf of the College community, we congratulate the Year 12 Class of 2022 on their excellent South Australian Certificate of Education (SACE) results.

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We again had 100% South Australian Certificate of Education (SACE) completion rate, as has been the case for many years at Mount Carmel College. More than 99.4% of all grades awarded were C- or higher and there were no E grades at all.

Special congratulations to our Dux of 2022, Jessica Ho, who achieved an adjusted ATAR of 96.60.

91% of our students who applied for university received an offer in the first round and of these, 75% were offered their first preference.

We are very proud of the outstanding results achieved by our Year 12 students. We know that excellent academic achievements are the result of a lot of hard work and the wonderful partnership in learning between the student, parents, teachers, support staff and the College. Our Year 12 students enthusiastically participated in the many different opportunities open to them through Mount Carmel College.

Western Technical College

We are very fortunate to be one of a small number of schools who also have a trade training centre as part of our school. The Western Technical College, a campus of Mount Carmel College and located across the street from our Secondary Campus at Rosewater, offers a wide range of courses. Newer courses such as electrotechnology and automotive servicing are already very

popular, whilst traditional favourites such as building and construction, carpentry, hair and beauty and metal engineering continue to attract strong enrolments.

The evidence clearly supports the theory that the students who get the most out of schools such as Mount Carmel College are those who enthusiastically embrace the educational, cultural, sporting and social justice offerings available.

A group of Italian students from MCC volunteered to take part in the 67th Annual Feast to celebrate the popular Italian Saint from Southern Italy, Saint Hilarion. The Feast Mass was attended by over a thousand people. The two Italian Radio Stations broadcasted the event and did not miss the opportunity to interview the students adding more excitement to the experience.

Shakespeare Is Dead!

On Friday 23 September, the Year 10 English classes and the Year 9 Drama class were fortunate enough to be able to see a wonderful live performance by the Bell Shakespeare Theatre Company from Sydney. The performance was called Shakespeare Is Dead! and it was a composite play borrowing from many of the famous playwright's works. We had 3 actors come to perform their rendition of Shakespeare's life, Ruby, Chrissy, and Lawrence, who put on a funny yet educational performance. We were their last show in Adelaide, and their 45th show so far this year, and they call themselves The Players.

We learnt that through the 37 plays that Shakespeare himself wrote, he added over 2000 words to the English language, such as: Generous, Fashionable, Swagger, Manager, Eyeball, Moon-Beam and many more words that we use every day.

The Players invited students up on stage as part of their interactive activities. They invited Teresa and Tyson up on stage to play feuding enemies from the Capulet and Montague houses from Romeo and Juliet. The Players even invited up Mrs Mackereth, who played Gertrude from Hamlet, the unsuspecting queen and mother of the titular character who gets poisoned. Mrs Mackereth did an amazing job, particularly when gasping and falling to the floor, as she acted out the infamous death scene. If she is not back next year at Mount Carmel College, she is definitely in Sydney becoming an actress!

There were 5 Acts that The Players went through with us. Each of the Acts had a specific focus which were as follows: Act 1 – how to speak in Shakespearean language, Act 2 – How to fall in love in Shakespeare's plays, Act 3 – how to fight in Shakespeare's plays, Act 4 – How to die in Shakespeare's plays, and lastly Act 5 – how to survive in a Shakespearean play.

The Players borrowed from various Shakespearean plays to demonstrate these 5 different Acts, such as: Macbeth, Romeo and Juliet, Hamlet and Taming of the Shrew. This was effective, as it gave us a broad overview of the breadth and scope of the famous bard's play-writing career.

We also learnt that throughout all of Shakespeare's plays, he had created 74 characters, in various genres, such as, Tragedy, Romance, Comedy and History.

The Players taught us about Prologues, which is when a play begins by setting the context, and Epilogues, which is when a play is coming to an end and the actors have to start 'wrapping up' the various plotlines. Shakespeare's plays usually end with a big speech done by a main character in the respective play. And that is how The Players finished their performance for us as well.

The Players were wonderfully talented and highly trained actors, who put on a performance which was both engaging and educational. With minimal use of props, the actors were able to effortlessly tell tales from various Shakespearean plays, while also providing informative and fascinating explanations about the playwright's importance to our literary history.
