Fantastic Year 12 SACE results for 2023

On behalf of the College community, we congratulate the Year 12 Class of 2023 on their excellent South Australian Certificate of Education (SACE) results.

We again had 100% South Australian Certificate of Education (SACE) completion rate, as has been the case for many years

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at Mount Carmel College. More than 99% of all grades awarded were C- or higher and there were no E grades at all.

Special congratulations to our Dux of 2023, James Pham.

Over 92% of our students who applied for university received an offer in the first round and of these, 72% were offered their first preference.

We are very proud of the outstanding results achieved by our Year 12 students. We know that excellent academic achievements are the result of a lot of hard work and the wonderful partnership in learning between the student, parents, teachers, support staff and the College. Our Year 12 students enthusiastically participated in the many different opportunities open to them through Mount Carmel College.

Building Projects

We are undertaking major building projects on both our Secondary Campus and Primary Campus.

Work is progressing well on our Carmelite Courts where the stadium is being completely rebuilt. The double basketball courts will be fully airconditioned and the latest big screen experience.

On the Primary Campus early works have commenced for the construction of a new, state fo the art double storey classroom building, which will include additional toilets and a new canteen.

We have also just been granted planning approval for the construction of a new building on the Secondary Campus and we hope to begin construction late this year.

These projects are part of our ongoing plan to provide our students with an excellent environment for learning.

Western Technical College

With the current state government and federal government push for students with trade skills, we are very fortunate to be one of a small number of schools who also have a trade training centre as part of our College. The Western Technical College, a campus of Mount Carmel College and located across the street from our Secondary Campus at Rosewater, offers a wide range of courses. Newer courses such as electrotechnology, automotive servicing and plumbing are very popular, whilst traditional favourites such as building and construction, carpentry, hair and beauty and metal engineering continue to attract strong enrolments.

Grasp the Opportunities

The evidence clearly supports the theory that the students who get the most out of schools such as Mount Carmel College are those who enthusiastically embrace the educational, cultural, sporting and social justice offerings available.

Students at our College have the opportunity to participate in a number of voluntary activities including inter-school sports competitions, debating, a school Musical every two years and an Expressive arts Showcase, Pedal Prix and STEM MAD, to name a few.

Year 10 History Excursion

As part of the 10 History curriculum students study World War II. A new museum was opened in 2020 in Wakefield Street around the Holocaust, and in August, Mrs Vlahos and I took a group of students to investigate this amazing resource. After completing a 150-word persuasive argument convincing me that it would benefit their studies, 20 students were selected to attend.

The day started with listening to Tamas the Education Coordinator explaining a few key things about the Holocaust, doing some primary source analysis activities and questions then doing the Holocaust static museum tour for about 30 minutes. They worked in collaboration to find information



and answer questions related to each of the 6 South Australian survivors.

The students really enjoyed hearing about the stories of the Holocaust survivors and the lesson learnt was that the prejudice and discrimination of the past should help us today and, in the future, to try and prevent some of these things happening again.

STEM

Year 4 have risen to the challenges of STEM this year and look forward to these lessons each week. This has supported the development of teamwork with the focus on communicating with one another, making decisions on design elements, testing their designs, and analysing their success as a team.

Some of the activities they have carried out so far have been creating the tallest freestanding towers using only paper, building a bridge that need to have the ability to hold objects heavier than a kilogram without collapsing and they worked together to see if their team could make the longest paper chain made from just one piece of paper.

We have been privileged to be able to be a part of the Sony and University of Adelaide's Shark Tank program run with Stage 1 Business Innovation students. MCC has 6 teams consisting of Dsvio, Recipe4Kids, Techdefenders, Openmind, Guardian Angels and Vector Cams which are all about problems to be solved by creating apps or websites to help the community address certain issues which the students identified as being an issue in society.

The students have gone through the Design process, watched Masterclass videos from the Uni and business professionals, and had a webinar with one of the sponsors SANTOS. Then the process of preparing for their 3-minute Pitch for the Shark Tanks to judge. This was conducted remotely this year and the top 3 teams from the class have been chosen to go to the semi-finals below:
