


Some of the students have expressed what they have enjoyed the most about reading 'Runt'.



Japanese Excursion





On Thursday 5 September, my Japanese class went on a shopping excursion to the Central Market in order to gain a better understanding of Asian cultures in general and Japanese culture in particular. Honestly, that was perhaps my first time going to the Central Market since I moved to Australia, and the excursion turned out to be an unforgettable memory for me.

It was a cold, brilliantly sunny day, the kind that makes all the kids in all the classrooms stare out the window and wish for summer. After the first lesson, we met at around 9:25am in the amphitheatre area and were thoroughly instructed by our teacher - Mr Rijk - until approximately 10:00am. Each of us was given a clipboard, a schedule to follow, and some worksheets to complete once we arrived at the Central Market. We left our school not long afterward and walked to the train station to catch a train to the city. At 10:21am, my class and I arrived at the Adelaide City Train Station and caught a tram to the Central Market. When we reached

the Central Market, I was amazed at how big and bustling it was!

Mr Rijk divided the class into two groups; each group consisted of 8 people. One group, led by Ms Shaw, would visit Little Tokyo, a small shop near Central Market that sells several Japanese items, and the other group, led by Mr Rijk, would visit Thuan Phat Supermarket. My friends and I were put in Mr Rijk's group so we made it to the supermarket. At Thuan Phat Supermarket, we were asked to try finding the ingredients listed on the worksheet and note down the cost as well as the brand name of each ingredient. This place provides a variety of Asian food ingredients with very affordable prices and the staff were super friendly. After we finished finding the ingredients, our group headed to Café Zuma for a recess break at around 11am.

Shortly after, Mr Rijk told the class to get in small groups of 3 or 5 to walk around the market in order to complete our shopping list worksheets. This was the best part of the entire excursion! My friends and I were having a great time exploring the Central Market and wandering around the various stalls. The market was truly a foodie's paradise with a wide range of tasty foods and drinks to choose from!

By 12:20pm, we reported back to Café Zuma to taste some sushi. Sushi has always been my favourite Japanese dish so I wasn't surprised by how good it was. After that, the group that had visited Little Tokyo would now visit Thuan Phat Supermarket and vice versa. In this way, my group then went to Little Tokyo with Mr Rijk and completed parts in the worksheet that related to this shop. An hour later, we moved to the food court for lunch. There, my friends and I got some crispy salt and pepper squid, meat skewers, and chicken feet. The food was unexpectedly delicious! Thinking back now, I'm not sure if the food was already good or if it was because we shared it together.

After lunch, my class went to get bubble tea at Gong Cha and Milk Flower. I got myself a taro milk tea with egg pudding. It was such a creamy combination! At around 2pm, we had to leave the market and return to Adelaide Train Station to catch a train back to school. Before leaving, we took some pictures as a whole class in front of Hong Kong Supermarket to preserve the memory of the trip.

I was so exhausted that I almost fell asleep a couple of times on the way back. But above all, we had a brilliant day and I believe the shopping excursion was a great experience for not only me but also all the students who attended. I've learnt many new Katakana and Hiragana words for food items as well as non-food/ drink items, such as $\forall \lor \lor \lor$ (orange), $\forall \forall \forall$ (banana), and $\gtrless u$ (buckwheat noodles), that will definitely be helpful for me when shopping in Japan.

Cybersafe Families Presentation

On Wednesday 21 August, the College was fortunate to have Todd Murfitt from Cybersafe Families present to the community. Children are increasingly feeling pressure to engage in online platforms, and as parents, Todd was able to articulate the importance of open dialogue to support them when they face online challenges.

The presentation highlighted that cyber bullying peaks at 14 years of age, and whilst this can be confronting for parents, the best advice was to walk alongside your children, taking an interest in how they engage in the digital world.

On the evening, Todd discussed a number of different social media platforms and highlighted that the legal age of using these platforms is 13 years old. Todd elaborated on this, suggesting that this is not due to developmental milestones among children, but links to the legalities surrounding how these companies use and distribute data they collect about their users. It must be recognised that children are fantastic adopters of technology, and online trends are continually evolving. The popular approach among children is to suggest that "everyone else has..." and this can create pressure to allow use of social media platforms or technology. By maintaining dialogue with other parents, you empower each other to determine the pace these platforms and technologies are adopted, remembering it is far easier to delay the use than pull it back.

The presentation highlighted the link social media, exposure to uncensored content and online conflict has to mental health. The message here was that whilst these platforms will present issues, there are several changes to look for in your child; including becoming quiet or withdrawn whilst using their technology, positioning themselves so their screen cannot be seen or becoming visibly upset.

Importantly, Todd suggested some fantastic strategies to support children.



- Stay calm and listen. If children are worried about our response, they will be less likely to talk about it next time.
- Talk through how to solve the problem together.
- Utilise Google Family Link or Apple Downtime to put in place screentime limits.
- Maintain clear family values. It is okay to say "NO". Despite the pressure that technology can create, you absolutely have the right to dictate the rules of phone/tablet use as the parent in the relationship.
