### Student Absences/ Late Arrivals

When a student is absent or going to be late, parents should notify the school by 9am on that day by texting the Absentee Line on 0438 368 846 (SMS) or phoning (08) 8447 0500. You will need to state the following:

NAME OF CHILD, YEAR LEVEL, **REASON FOR ABSENCE** *eg If late* approximately what time will your child arrive etc.

A medical certificate is required if a student is away for more than 3 days. For any planned extended absence, a letter to the Principal is required to explain circumstances.

After discussing these shapes, they used their knowledge to draw them and then applied techniques like shading and shadowing to bring their drawings to life. The results are beautiful, detailed pieces that showcase their understanding of light, shadow, and form.

All this hard work has culminated in some incredible displays that are now proudly on show in the front office and around the classrooms. These pieces highlight the creativity and dedication of our Year 4 students and are a wonderful reflection of their growing confidence in visual arts.


We are so proud of the amazing effort and talent shown by the Year 4 artists this term, and we can't wait to see where their creativity takes them next!



# **Stage 1 Business Excursion**

On Thursday, 7 November, students from Stage 1 Business Innovation travelled to Tonsley Innovation Park with Mrs Daviess (HASS LAC) and myself, to see first-hand some of the established businesses and start-ups involved in driving world-class innovation and future industries. The Park is situated on the site of the old Mitsubishi car manufacturing plant which closed in 2008, and is host to over 2000 employees in 140 organisations involved in advanced manufacturing in sectors, such as:

- Automation, software and simulation
- Mining and energy services
- Health, medical devices, and assistive technologies
- Cleantech and renewable energy.

Students were given a tour of the site by our highly engaging host Teresa Janowski, the founder and CEO of Stemfasttrack, an organisation dedicated to assisting students reach their career goals in such industries. A local start-up that was particularly inspiring was Micro-X Limited. A company that designs, develops, and manufactures ultra-lightweight, mobile x-ray imaging equipment for global medical and security markets. SAGE Automation, Australia's leading independent industrial automation and control systems integrator, was another impressive highlight.

The excursion included a tutorial session for students on how to achieve their career aspirations in innovative industries, and a practical workshop that tested students design and problem-solving skills.

The visit to this leading edge innovation district enabled students to gain a deeper understanding of the activities and resources required of startup businesses, which proved highly beneficial to recent assessment tasks on business models and their cost and revenue strategies.

All up, this was an inspiring experience for students and staff that provided a glimpse of the emerging and future technologies and careers. It is an excursion that is recommended for all students interested in learning about the skills and future pathways.
